






Saco Lodge No. 9 conducted it annual Outdoor Degree.






For the second year in a row, the Saco Masonic Families gathered together and took to the road on October  $7^{th}$  to raise money and awareness for Alzheimer's disease. Present



Speech from VW Carl Marsano given to the brethren of Saco Lodge:

First of all, I want to thank Worshipful Greg for honoring us for our service to Saco Lodge. I got me to thinking, which is always a dangerous thing, about Table Lodges. You see it's the DER in me coming out.

- Well after reading the ritual for table lodge and its history, the GL website tells us that The Table Lodge is no mere banquet or dinner it is a special ceremony. It is complete with a Ritual which incorporates terminology of centuries ago. It includes toasts, Masonic songs, and a good Masonic speaker. We emphasize "good Masonic Speaker" because no other kind will do. (I am afraid you guys are stuck with us)
- Famous Masonic authority H. L. Haywood, in "More About Masonry" says: "In the Eighteenth Century Lodges the Feast bulked so large in the lodge that in many of them the members were seated at the table when the lodges were opened and remained at it throughout the Communication, even when the degrees were conferred. The result was that Masonic fellowship was good fellowship in it, as in a warm and fruitful soil, acquaintanceship, friendship, and affection could flourish - there was no grim and silent sitting on a bench, staring across at a wall...to such a lodge no member went grudgingly, nor had to be coaxed, nor was moved by that ghastly, cold thing called a sense of duty, but went as if drawn by a magnet, and counted the days until he could go. "What business has any lodge to be nothing but a machine for grinding out the work: It was not called into existence in order to have the minutes read (ironically as Secretary I agree with this): Even a mystic tie will snap under the strain of cheerlessness, repetition, monotony, dullness. A lodge needs a fire lighted in it, and the only way to have that warmth is to restore the lodge Feast, because when it is restored, good fellowship and brotherly love will follow, and where good fellowship is, members will fill up an empty room

So you see even Grand Lodge thinks a table lodge is a good thing...

Now as I look back, I realized that it has been ten years since I filled out my application to join Saco Lodge. I can remember as if it was yesterday, stopping by Father in Law's house on the way back from the Rumford mill to get his signature. He also, did me a favor, and sent me a message which looking back now I can appreciate now. You see when I was going for my EA and FC degrees, he didn't come. He didn't need to. He told me, they will take care of me and he knew that they would. Such is the nature of our institution. He also knew that it would have been true of any lodge.

At the time of my raising I had no idea that I would be standing here tonight. This has caused me to look back over the past ten years and to quote the Grateful Dead, "What a Long Strange Trip It's Been". In fact I had no idea what I was getting into, that was obvious. If someone had told me, I never would have believed it or if I did, it might have scared me off.

You see, my wife and I had just moved back to Maine from what we termed our 9 years in exile and had only moved to Saco the year prior. Both of us, graduated from the "big city", Portland for those you who don't know, so we really didn't know that many people in Saco.

Tonight, I look out at the columns on my left and right and what do I see. I see not brothers but friends. Most of you I did not know prior to joining Saco Lodge. This, my brothers is the key to Masonry, one of our tenets. This brotherly love, fellowship or friendship, call it what you want. It is the foundation that makes us great. Or as we like to say it is the cement that binds us into a sacred band or Society of Friends and brothers.

Just a couple weeks ago in the Maine Sunday Telegram, they had an article discussing the lengths people go to meet friends when they move to a new city or town. In this connected age, people are even less connected to each other and their community. If they only knew what we know about Masonry and how easy it is to make friends and be a part of the community. All they have to do is to talk to a brother, fill out an application, come to a few meetings and get to know the members.

So when we gather tonight as a Table Lodge, we are not only acknowledging our past practices of the 18 century, but we are celebrating one of our tenets of our profession, brotherly love.

Let me conclude with this quote... Some of you may recognize this.

Finally, my Brethren, as this association has been formed and perfected in so much unanimity and concord, in which we greatly rejoice, so may it long continue. May you long enjoy every satisfaction and delight which disinterested friendship can afford. May kindness and brotherly affection distinguish your conduct as men and as Masons. And may the tenets of our profession be transmitted through your lodge, pure and unimpaired, from generation to generation.
