2018 marked the two hundredth sixteenth year of the founding of Saco Lodge #9. At that time the Grand Lodge of Maine was non-existent, and we were chartered by the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts since Maine was still a province of that state.

1820 brought the formation of Maine as a state and the Grand Lode of Maine was formed and Saco Lodge #9 retained its identity and obtained its number.

Saco Lodge #9 continues to be an active part of the communities with its many programs and participation in city life and community service.

January 4, 2017 brought us to our stated meeting with the election of new officers and appointments to various committees. We celebrate the fact that this marks the 9th year in a row that a Past Master has no re-occupied the Master chair in Saco Lodge. The last Master that served 4 times as Master of Saco Lodge was Worshipful Greg Milliken.

Dr. George Patrick Shaw was born in Manistique, Michigan on August 8, 1929. Initiated to

the Degree of an Entered Apprentice on November 24, 1950. Passed to the Degree of a Fellowcraft on December 29, 1950. Raised in Lakeside Lodge, No. 371 in Manistique, Michigan on March 24, 1951. He Affiliated with Saco Lodge on December 4, 1963. He remained a dual member for the rest of his life. He served in the following chairs: Marshal – 1966, Senior Steward – 1967 and 1970, Junior Deacon in 1971, Senior Deacon in 1972, Junior Warden in 1973, Senior Warden in 1974, Worshipful Master in 1975, District Deputy Grand Master of the 18th District in 1977 and 1978.

At the time of his death he was chief of obstetrics and gynecology at Webber Hospital in Biddeford, now SMHC. He was a Deacon of the First Parish Church in Saco. He was a member of the US Naval Reserve. In 1979, he passed away suddenly in Waterville, ME at the age of 49.

In Saco Lodge the Light of Masonry is never dim, only because the sun shines brighter as we continue to work in the community and enjoy the summer with our family and friends.

July 14th brought us to our 5th annual picnic at Worshipful Justin Galipeau's home with a pig roast and all the fixings. As usual no lack of food or friendship, this is another way to get together with family and friends.

These date back to the founding of Saco Lodge, back when the city was called Pepperellborough. Pepperellborough was incorporated as a town in 1775; name changed in 1805 to Saco. The first entry is from August 5, 1802. Also, in this book is a copy of the original Charter and by-laws of the lodge. See below.

Greetings from the West,

As spring has finally arrived, I find myself with less free time to contemplate life and come up with these great articles that I always write (heavy sarcasm), so this month I have decided to print an article that I found regarding Masonic rings.

THE PROPER WAY TO WEAR A MASONIC RING

"What is the proper way to wear a Masonic ring? Should the points of the compass be toward or away from the body?

"If you were hanging the American flag, would you put the stars down? The same holds true of the ring. Usually it is a gift, and has sentimental value for the wearer. It should look right side up to him. Rings are therefore worn with the points of the compass toward the wearer."

This subject is one on which Grand Lodges have made no regulation and popular opinion is divided. We must therefore reason from analogy. When the emblem of the square and compasses is displayed on a building, pennant, button, watch charm etc., universal custom requires the points of the compass point downward. When displayed on the Altar they point away from the Master. As the Master from his station views the compass from the Altar of his lodge, the points are from, not towards him. As the wearer of a compass watch charm views it, the points are down and away from his eyes. In a similar way as he views the emblem on his ring the points should be down or away from his eyes.

The square is the symbol of earthly, the compass of heavenly perfection. As a combined emblem the ends of the square point up as a symbol of man's aspirations toward God; the points of the compass are down to represent heavenly qualities coming down from God to earth. Therefore it would seem that the proper way to wear a ring would be that is which its symbolism is best expressed; namely, that in which, when the hand is held in its usual position the points of the compass are towards the earth and away from the wearer's eyes.

Thus it will be seen that our conclusion does not agree with the writer in Temple Topics. He truly says that in hanging an American flag we would not put the stars down, but in hanging a compass or a square and compass, he surely would put the points of the compass down. The same rule holds when worn as a ring or button or a watch charm; namely, they would be worn the same way with the points down. When so worn they all serve the same purposes, and by no means the least of these purposes is to announce to the world the proud wearer is a Mason.

judgment or worries. You will be refreshed again and comfortable attending at any Lodge.



A fire that is still the largest single fire within a state. For the record, the Salvation used our kitchen facilities during the forest fire crisis. A letter of appreciation from the Salvation Army was read in lodge on November 5, 1947. The Salvation Army thanked us for the use of the kitchen and equipment during the disaster to help feed those fighting the fire.



Although not documented within our records, I am sure our members played a larger role 51 years ago in October of 1947. It is unlikely that a brother would turn his back on a fellow neighbor when in need.

The week of Oct. 20 was a devastating week. The largest forest fire occurred in York County, in southern Maine, and burned 131,000 acres. Some idea of the size of this fire can be shown by the fact that it burned in 15 towns and had a fire line perimeter of 150 miles around. There were three separate fires involved. These fires were at widely separated points. On the day of the big wind of Oct. 23, these three fires were whipped into a fury never experienced by native firefighters in Maine. The North Kennebunkport fire, fanned by the wind, carried a solid wall of fire clear to the Atlantic Ocean, wiping out valuable summer beach homes and properties.

When the alarm went out, men and boys dropped what they were doing and rushed off to fight the fires. Men who went to work in small towns didn't know if they'd be called on to fight the Maine fires that day. Volunteers came from all over Maine, New Hampshire and Massachusetts. An eight-mile-long wall of fire burned in Kennebunkport. In North Waterboro, nearly 60 residents and volunteers were trapped for more than an hour behind a line of fire before escaping.

In York County, the fires destroyed most of the homes in Shapleigh and Waterboro. then swept toward the sea and consumed swathes of Alfred, Lyman, Newfield, Kennebunk, Kennebunkport, Arundel, Dayton, Wells, Biddeford and Saco. The Army-Navy Day in Boston scheduled for October 26 was cancelled. The **USS** *Little Rock*, a light cruiser harbored in Boston for the celebration, sailed to Portland instead with 1,000 servicemen and equipment to help fight the Maine fires. They saved the town of Hollis and many other small villages, working 'as if their own homes were endangered.'


